CHANCELLOR'S GREETING

To inaugurate a new and busy year for the University of Minnesota, Morris Retirees Association, here is a special message--just for us--from the Interim Chancellor, Sam Schuman: *I'm delighted to join the UMM Community in welcoming back the UMMRA to another interesting and productive academic year on the Morris campus. EMPOWERING UMMRA

Our Chancellor has graciously agreed to cover up to \$300 worth of our duplicating and postage costs through his office (the Fund Development Office already provides us with mailing labels). The UMMRA dues and bank account are separate, allowing us to act and speak as an independent organization, but the new funding gives us a useful "presence" on campus. It should be possible now for us to better assist the University in serving its retirees (and to mail more newsletters).

This summer we also entered into a cooperative effort in record-keeping. Your president signed a written agreement with Sarah Mattson, the UMM Director of Human Resources, which will permit her to release to UMMRA the names and addresses of all retirees and to update this information when her office receives notice of a change. In return, UMMRA agrees not to use the names and addresses for other purposes (don't blame your junk mail on us, in other words).

Another aspect of the new record-keeping set-up is that we now receive information from the West Central Experiment Station concerning its retirees. We are on the mailing list of the Extension Service, too. University College employees are already included on UMM's lists. The West Central School of Agriculture retirees are on the list we receive from the UMM Fund Office. Thus we hope we've covered everyone. Please write or call Ellen Ordway, our Treasurer, if you have questions or know of someone who may have been left out.

Chancellor Schuman has also indicated his willingness to see that UMMRA has space somewhere on campus (more than just the mail drop at the Faculty Center). Space is at a premium right now because of the construction, so your Board has not pressed this issue in these first busy fall weeks, but we will continue to pursue the matter and are grateful to the Chancellor for his support.
